On learning, f-learning and thriving In July this little group of six churches will have an occasion to celebrate. Lots of us are going to Salisbury cathedral to see Richard Holness ordained as deacon because he will be coming to serve with us as curate. Now if you are thinking of curates and vicars as seen on television, Richard is not going to be curate in the style of Father Ted or Fleabag. On the other hand, those of you who know me will know I'm not really like the Vicar of Dibley - physically there might be a slight resemblance but in terms of my sense of humour and my ability to tell a joke I'm much closer to Alice Tinker than Geraldine Granger. Richard has been part of these churches longer than I have - he lives in RWB with his wife Fiona and their daughter Ruth and Broad Town is the parish that has married them, christened Ruth and helped develop his sense of being called to serve in ministry. Richard has already been doing this as a Lay Worship Leader but now he's going to have the very strange experience of being dressed up in a collar and apprenticed to serve the whole group while still working full time and being husband, dad, friend, colleague, IT geeky person and himself.

My task is to help him continue to find out what that all means for him - Richard has already learned lots - he's been at college in Salisbury studying part time and now our task is to do lots (or at least as much as can be sensibly fitted in around full time work and life) of f-learning on the job. F-learning is not Rachma having a bad language moment but the skill she has begun learning from the local schools of seeing making mistakes, and failing as a route to greater learning. Failure-learning - abbreviated to f-learning A curacy is a time and place for experimentation trying and succeeding, and sometimes trying and failing so that one can learn and learn to fail better next time. Much of the trying and failing will be done by Rachma not by Richard! It's a compliment to all the churches in the groups that they thought we were willing to be experimented on and supportive of this apprenticeship element of Richard's preparation for life as an ordained minister seeking to serve God at home, at work, and sometimes here in our churches. HILMARTON PARISH COUNCIL - ANNUAL PARISH REPORT 2023

Chairman

I have pleasure once again in submitting a short report for the previous year which seems to have come and gone so guickly. I would like to thank all the Parish Councillors for their continued support, and to our Wiltshire Councillor, Cllr Ashley O'Neill who takes so much interest in what we do and what we try to achieve. This is all seamlessly supported with the work that our Clerk, Jacquie does which I often see first-hand and it is very much appreciated. There have been some very positive outcomes this year resulting from our combined efforts as well as the endless form filling that Jacquie has done to secure the funding for our Jubilee Play Park refurbishment. It is heartening to be stopped in my tracks around the parish from time to time and have Parishioners acknowledge this good work too.

Earlier in the year we were approached by the Chair of Governors for Hilmarton Primary School to see if any councillors would be willing to join their Board of Governors. Similar to us they hold only a few meetings a year with "minimum commitment" but the reality for them and us is to be effective can take considerable time and commitment to get the desirable results. On this occasion we were unable to oblige them but I know our Clerk offered some pointers which I believe helped them to find what they were looking for.

Our Councillors represent our Parish well, both in geographical spread and workload. Thank you for what you all do and time you freely give, especially when representing Hilmarton Parish Council at LHFIG and Area Board Meetings.

One person's work and scheme we should acknowledge is that of the Parish Steward. If you see him around do go and say hello. He does an excellent job for us and does it with pride, often supported with before and after photographs showing us what he has done on his visits. As I was going back through my notes to make sure I hadn't missed anything I was reminded of the passing of HM Queen Elizabeth, which then reminded me of others from our community that have left us, including a long serving Parish Councillor, Richard Keevil. My thoughts are with them all as they played such an important part in our small community.

Some progress has been made with our ongoing commitment to traffic management through Goatacre and Hilmarton. Speed Indicator Devices, (SID's) have been budgeted for and it is hoped to have them ordered and deployed this coming year. Updates have been given throughout the year and more will follow.

The process we have for commenting on Planning Applications on the whole works well and where we do have concerns these are always carefully considered and commented on. Parish Councils do not make planning decisions, a misconception that we do will probably not change anytime soon. However, our input is invaluable given our local knowledge and is an important part of the process regardless of the final decisions. Please continue to contribute in the manner we always do respecting both the applicant and the wider community. I look forward to the coming year with your full support and enthusiasm to ensure we have a vibrant forward looking Parish Council.

Finance

Every year internal and external auditors audit the Parish Council accounts. Many thanks to Chris Chapman for fulfilling the Internal Auditor role again this year. Our External Auditors are PKF Littlejohn LLP from London, following our Annual Parish Council Meeting our accounts are forwarded to them for approval.

The precept for 2023/2024 is set at £13500.00 This request has been raised from last year due to ever increasing costs and we have also budgeted to purchase two speed indicator devices in Goatacre and Hilmarton. Planning

Over the last 12 months there have been 21 planning applications within the Parish.

12 were permitted, 2 were refused, 2 were withdrawn and 5 are pending a decision by Wiltshire Council (WC). Of the above applications one of the decisions made by WC differed from the recommendation of Hilmarton Parish Council.

Play Park

This has been an exciting year for the play park it has received a new climbing tower with fireman's pole, climbing net, a double tower with bridge, A swing net seat, a roundabout, a zip wire, a toddler train with slide and interactive ticket station and new safety surfaces. We have received great feedback from children and parents and it has been lovely seeing and hearing the fun and laughter coming from that area in the Parish.

Dear readers, this is something that was discussed at a recent Parish Council meeting. Please take a few minutes to read the information as you may be able to help. Thank you.

What do you know about Ash dieback?

Ash dieback will kill around 90% of ash trees across the UK. It will change the landscape forever and threaten many species which rely on ash.

There is an urgent need for all landowners to identify affected trees growing alongside the highway, public rights of way and in public spaces.

This is a serious public safety issue and landowners are responsible for dealing with it on their land.

Tress on private land away from public access can be left, the resulting dead wood, will continue to provide essential habitat for a range of wildlife including insects, nesting birds, roosting bats and a whole range of other small mammals.

What does ash dieback look like and can it be identified in the winter as well as in leaf?

Look out for sunken and dark lesions on the branches and trunk, and young shoots or twigs with a dark purplish tinge. There may also be dead twigs and branches in the upper crown of the tree.

Ash dieback can affect ash trees of all ages. Younger trees succumb to the disease quicker but in general, all affected trees will have these symptoms:

In the summer leaves develop dark patches. They then wilt and discolour to black. Leaves might shed early. Lesions develop where branches meet the trunk. These are often diamond-shaped and dark brown.

What should I do if my tree has ash dieback?

You can help stop the local spread of ash dieback by collecting the fallen ash leaves and burning, burying or deep composting them. This disrupts the fungus's lifecycle.

Should ash dieback be reported?

If you find a suspected case of ash dieback in your area which you believe has not previously been reported you should report your suspicions to the relevant plant health authority.
